Learning Japanese at Niigata University

You can study Japanese independently using online learning materials and other resources.

However, it is not easy to develop the ability to communicate your ideas and feelings to others in Japanese through self-study alone.

At Niigata University, we place particular emphasis on developing the Japanese ability needed to express and communicate your own ideas.

To communicate your ideas accurately in Japanese in a range of situations, you need to be able to use appropriate expressions when needed.

To achieve this, it is important to move beyond learning that relies only on grammatical knowledge.

Many learners may feel that they still cannot communicate effectively despite studying hard. Understanding grammar is important, but grammar alone does not readily lead to the ability to use Japanese in practice.

To use Japanese effectively, you need practical training in actually using the language.

This is similar to improving at a sport.

Simply practicing without a clear method will not lead to improvement. First, it is important to learn the basic forms and practice them repeatedly. Once you have a solid foundation, you can gradually develop your own way of using the language and apply what you have learned.

To help students acquire these basic forms, Niigata University offers speaking, interaction, and writing courses under the category of Learning Japanese.

For students who already have a foundation, we also offer reading and specialized courses that help them develop their own ways of using Japanese.

In courses categorized as Learning in Japanese, students can take reading courses covering a variety of Japanese texts, courses for students seeking employment in Japan, and collaborative courses with Japanese students. Opportunities are also available to learn about Japanese society and culture.

Choose courses that match your level and goals and develop your ability to learn and communicate in Japanese step by step.

(Semester-long)

To acquire practical Japanese language skills and knowledge for job hunting and working in Japan, and to develop the ability to communicate effectively in professional and job-hunting situations.

* JLPT N2 or above is recommended.

2. Learning in Japanese Subjects

(Term-long)

- Cross Cultural Learning A/B/C/D
- Active Learning B/C

(Semester-long)

- Intercultural Collaborative Learning A/B

Japanese and international students learn together through group work, discussions, and collaborative projects to develop intercultural understanding, communication skills, and problem-solving abilities.

* Cross-Cultural Learning A is taught in both Japanese and English. Active Learning B is taught in both Japanese and English, while active Learning C is taught mainly in Japanese.

3. Learning in English Subjects

(Term-long)

- Active Learning A
- What is Japan A/B/C/D

Japanese and international students participate in group work and discussions in English to deepen their understanding of Japanese culture and society.

- Studies in Japanese Culture I / II

Students learn about Japanese culture, society, and everyday customs, and deepen their understanding of Japan through group work and discussions.

■ Course Registration

- Register through the Student Web System.
- Registration is available from your enrollment date, Sunday, September 20.

■ Registration Deadlines

- Term 1 and Term 3 courses, including term-long and semester-long courses (ex:260GXXXX, 261GXXXX, 263GXXXX)
→By the day before the first class
- Term 2 and Term 4 courses, including term-long courses (ex:262GXXXX, 264GXXXX)
→By the registration deadline for the relevant term
 - * Deadlines vary by academic year. Check the Student Web System.
 - * Classes for the second semester of academic year 2026, Term 3, begin on Friday, October 2.

■ Class Format

- Courses may be offered in person or online.
- A computer or tablet is required for online classes.

- Some courses cannot be taken if you are unable to use Zoom or Teams.

■ Eligibility

- Priority is given to undergraduate students and undergraduate exchange students from partner universities.
- Graduate students and research students may enroll if space is available.
- Students' family members, researchers, and international faculty members are not eligible to enroll.
